III. MISCELLANEOUS ISSUES

A. Black History Month Activities and Other College Activities

Christina Blanton discussed the Black History Month activities she is doing at GCC as part of her diversity internship project.

David Finley shared information about “SMCC's first annual film festival that is being held on Friday and Saturday March 4th and 5th. All five of the films that we're viewing fit in perfect with the District's concerns with promoting diversity and multiculturalism.” Friday they will be showing “the documentary Laramie Inside Out, which is about the Matthew Shepard murder in Wyoming. It is directed by Beverly Seckinger from U of A and has won a number of awards. She will actually be on our campus and will talk about her film. We're also showing Frida that night probably.” All films are free.

David stated that “on Saturday we're showing Real Women Have Curves that's loosely based on the play by Josephina Lopez, I believe; Antwone Fischer which is Denzel Washington's directorial debut, and Whalerider.”

IV. GUEST SPEAKER: MS. KATHIE GUMMERE, ARIZONA HUMAN RIGHTS FUND (AHRF)

Ms. Gummere spoke about GLBTQQA (Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Questioning, and Androgynous) issues. She spoke of the Gay community being the most invisible group. She also passed out a wonderful handout that contained definitions, myths, and great resource information. Ms. Gummere also discussed common heterosexist language, providing examples that individuals in the homosexual / gay / queer community are exposed to on a daily basis. Ms. Gummere provided historical legal precedents and current legal issues affecting the GLBTQ community.

Ms. Gummere mentioned current television programs on this issue such as a **Frontline special entitled “Assault on Gay America”** which profiles Mel White. Also, **NoLongerSilent.org** (<http://www.nolongersilent.org/>) which is a website with over 187 ministers (mostly heterosexual) who speak out on poor treatment of the GLBTQ community. There was also an **“Outfest” film festival** at Camelview.

Deborah stated that “unfortunately, the Springerlink web site is a subscription web site and only the abstract is available on line without a subscription. I do have a copy of the entire article if some one would like to borrow it to read. But because of copy write laws, I can't make more copies than the one I have.”

V. FACULTY PRESENTATIONS

Gita Perkins (EMCC) discussed how she infused her Chemistry (CHM 130) course with an emphasis on having a better representation of women chemists. For example, students researched the contributions made by Madam Marie Curie with radioisotopes and by Dorothy Crowfoot Hodgekin who crystallized insulin. Gita provided several handouts and work her students created. She also showed video presentations that her students did in her class where they share the information about the female chemists they researched.

Deborah Van Marche (GCC) infused her Introduction to Psychology (PSY 101) course by using a number of assignments including having the students write reviews of articles and do class presentations that explored a particular culture. All of the assignments used were designed to help students not only learn about different cultures but also to help them connect cultural awareness and knowledge to the learning of psychology throughout the course.

Tina Rangel (MCC) provided examples of how she infused her Introduction to Dance course (DAH 100 is a humanities course). Tina asks her students to share something they have with them that's important and which identifies them as a person. Tina also created a “Ritual And Tradition Questionnaire” that her students complete. She provided copies of this questionnaire for others to see. In addition, she talks about the cultural influence and cultural impact of the various aspects and types of dance that she was teaching.

Terry Mitich (MCC) infused her course on Fundamentals in Health Care Delivery. She used a vast array of class activities to bring diversity concepts to her class. For example, she shows videos (such as “A Class Divided”), she assigns a paper for students to explore their personal values and has them do a mini cultural assessment. She brought in a wonderful guest speaker who discussed death and dying and who was able to bring humor to the discussion. The students also complete a “Did You Know” assignment where they list 20 fascinating facts about a diverse group of people. One of the things she did this last semester was to push herself and her students out of their comfort zones and discuss concepts such as gay, lesbian, and transgender issues in health care.
